

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For a long time, I thought the unique work of mission at CBF was outreach to NYC youth and the Special Needs Community. We set out to create a safe place where the gospel could be heard and lived out. Our focus was to heal the warped understanding of God with His Word and help everyone to get their identity and value through relationship with Christ. We knew that as this happened, individuals who found this deep identity would discover their God-given purpose and develop significant relationships in the body of Christ. With all that said, what makes this a peculiar mission only became clear to me in the last few years.

I came to CBF with a lot of pride in my intellectual understanding of the Word combined with hard work, successes in business, and a passion for changing the world for Jesus. How could I fail? Fail I did, and as that failure grew in my marriage relationship, finances, and ability to execute the mission, I fell into a deep depression. I was at the "Dark Night of the Soul." In God's grace and timing, I found one of the most important and peculiar aspects of Christian mission: God's way is upside down from the world's way.

As I strived for success, God led me to deep brokenness and poverty of spirit. I came to love Matt. 5:3, "Blessed are the



poor in spirit for theirs is the kingdom of God." Mission did not come from striving; it came from deep poverty that requires all of me to rely on God's power. God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble, and in finding humility, I began to learn how to love others the way Christ loves me. CBF is a Peculiar Mission indeed! Throughout this season, we spent time with our friends at Elevate, and boy did we walk with them through some "peculiar" activities. We took these students through a series of challenges to help them explore their understanding of themselves, their community, and how they interact with the world. All of this, while we shared our stories of the life-changing inner Journey we are on with Jesus. Many of these students were unsure about this at first. Walking uphill, in the woods, and in dim light is not always the most comfortable thing. However, by the end, their demeaner changed to smiles, laughter and the beginning of an excellent discussion of who they are.

One of the most impactful moments I experienced this season was a note we received from Elevate. A portion of it read, "I learned from them that everyone experiences a setback in their life, but you should use that setback as fuel to keep pushing forward. This moment impacted me because I haven't experienced any life-changing setbacks yet, but I now know that if I share out these setbacks, it will push me forward." These students are listening, and they are hungry for connection and growth. We are all working towards our personal renewal, and when that spills over, at times you get to see just a glimpse of corporate renewal at work. Children's Bible Fellowship of New York has taught me an unexpected lesson. To be heard is a gift. To be heard is healing. To be heard is loving. Growing up I followed a faith tradition that focused on Biblical knowledge. The person up front teaching for an hour would give you as many bible references as you could handle, and you feverishly tried to keep up with notes and flipping to the next chapter and verse. It was like growing up in seminary (except I don't have any theological degrees and I'm not even sure how much of the teaching was accurate). But the example was clear: the man up front has all the answers. I grew up wanting to be that man.

As a young adult, I tried my best to help others. It seemed like no one knew how to live without my "clear understanding" of the bible. So, I helped, and I helped, and I helped. Now looking back, I can see that I was just posturing and trying to find my value in what others thought of me. Some of my greatest regrets are not from obvious "sins" but how I treated people. I discounted them, and I tried to control them by giving them "answers."

At Children's Bible Fellowship I found examples of people who knew a lot of the bible and yet continued to focus more and more on sharing with everyone, instead of fixing everyone with what they knew. I still remember the first day I arrived at camp, and I saw the example of leaders who



embraced their humility. They shared their testimonies filled with tragedy and shame boldly and when they prayed, they concluded with a simple yet profound "I love you God." They went first and shared of their hearts and lives and their example welcomed you to feel comfortable sharing yours.

When I visit a Hope Celebration Day, I still see that same unique mission at work. The mission to share of their own story first and to give others the dignity of being heard. To not just teach at them but share truth and ask them to participate. I see God at work healing the Hope campers and myself when I just listen. Then God gets all the glory, and I learn to look for the beauty that he continues to reveal in the lives of others who don't need more "answers" they just need to be heard.
